This past year L'Arche Seattle said goodbye to three of its beloved members.

**Carol Ludden,** co-pastor for L'Arche Seattle for over 20 years passed away July 7<sup>th</sup>.

Carol fought a long battle with cancer — over which she prevailed for more than a decade with great courage, determination and her characteristic good humor.

She constantly communicated her unwavering belief that the world is "charged with the grandeur of God" with wisdom, grace and humor and her life announced St. Paul's proclamation:

Finally, brothers and sisters, we wish you joy! Strive for full restoration, encourage one another, be of one mind, live in peace. And the God of love and peace will be with you. (2 Cor 13)

**Brady Twohy,** a member of our Board of Directors in the late 1980's, passed away November 8<sup>th</sup>. Brady had a remarkable depth of kindness and sincerity. "There was nothing that Brady enjoyed more than laughter, and no one who made him laugh like his wife, Doreen. Together they raised

three daughters, modeling for the girls the values of patience, wisdom, wit, imagination, and love."

Mike was enthusiastically celebrated when he returned for our Thanksgiving Dinner at St. Joe's.


We miss you Mike—your thoughtful soul, sense of humor and love of Johnny Cash.


